

Message from the Principal's Desk Mrs Sammantha Da Luz

Dear Parents and Carers

I had a very productive meeting with our new P&F leadership committee last week and it was exciting to share with them some updates for our college as well as develop new ideas together. It is therefore timely to also share with all of you where we are in terms of projects and priorities for our community.

ELC Playground: The P&F have sourced some nature play equipment which the proceeds of last year's Colour Run will be utilised towards as well as requests for funding from other areas. Sandpits are being cleaned and replenished, the cubby house is being lowered and a general clean up will be conducted during our Busy Bee to be scheduled soon. Once the grounds have been prepared and remedied, our new equipment will be able to be installed. Watch this space for those updates.

ELC Car Park: You may have noticed that we have received some crushed limestone recently. We are waiting for the use of a roller and more limestone to be delivered so that Mr A can remedy a section of the car park by the Jacaranda trees. This will then leave the turning circle unobstructed at the top end for our buses to safely turn around for drop offs and pickups and provide for adequate parking for all our visitors and staff.

Library: We are still very much focussed upon the remodelling and filling of our new library. We hope to engage a team of builders soon and in the meantime, Mrs Alison Brown has been busy collating materials and sourcing cataloguing systems organised for this purpose. As soon as we can get the tradespeople in, I will be able to inform you of our grand opening.

Administration: We are also awaiting final quotes on the remodelling of our Front Office. We are getting excited for the new space to provide for a larger reception area and additional office space.

Before and After School Care: A survey is going out next week to find out about the interest amongst our community to have a Kidz First centre at Immaculate Heart College. In order to proceed with our intentions, we need to ascertain as to the viability of such a partnership. If you are genuinely interested in accessing the facilities at IHC, please indicate so on the survey. A link will be sent out to all families next week.

Interventions: After reviewing last year's NAPLAN data and other standardised test results, we have committed to address priority areas of need. This has involved investing considerable sums of money in the training, upskilling and employment of current and new staff, purchasing resources and allocating specialist teaching spaces. Currently, we have two trained staff members: Mrs Alison Brown and Mrs Fiona Schmidt with a new member joining the team soon, who have been testing our students and organising small group interventions. This means we will be able to cover Years PP-10 using the MultiLit (Macquarie University) suite of programs from MiniLit Sage in the early learning years to MacQLit from Years 3-10. We also continue to carefully assess and monitor ALL our students in our classes to ensure that gaps are identified, which can then be addressed.

New College Master Plan: I am excited to announce that SITE Architecture Studio has been engaged to partner with us for the next phase of development and growth. We hope to work closely together to develop a vision for spaces which encourage pedagogical diversity and creative learning opportunities for our students, and where appropriate utilising the unique location and beauty of our rural setting. This includes addressing our most pressing concerns with overland stormwaters and proposed capital works priorities. I look forward to providing more detail to you next semester.

My thanks go to all staff members for their ongoing hard work and dedication to the students in their care and to our college community – this is evidenced by the number of correspondence and meetings that I have received notifications upon and/or been involved in throughout the past month. With the Interim Report Parent meetings coming up on Tuesday next week, it is a good time to come in and meet your children's teachers and to discuss any concerns and/or celebrate the successes thus far. If I don't get an opportunity to see you all then, I hope you will be able to attend the P&F meeting on Friday next week at 5pm at the Assembly hall – if not in person, then online. We are going live!

Congratulations and thanks to the PE team, staff, leaders and our wonderful P&F for a wonderfully organised and successful Primary Interhouse Swimming Carnival last week. It was lovely to see so many families who also came out to support their swimmers and the college. Well done to Prudence who were victors on the day!

I would like to end my newsletter this week with a special acknowledgement going to Georgia Knapp in Year 10. Georgia has been playing polocrosse since she was 6 years old. She has recently been rewarded for all her hard work and talents by being selected to represent Western Australia in the Junior Mixed side at the coming Albury Autumn Classic in NSW. From the Heart

This week began with the Feast of St Joseph. The Church regards Joseph as the Patron of the Universal Church. He is also the Patron Saint of workers.

St Joseph is not famous for spectacular miracles or being a person of great speeches. He was a quiet, hard-working tradesman. Sacred Scripture describes Joseph as a "just man" (Matthew 1: 19)



and from that we can conclude that he was totally dependable, intensely loyal and always honest. We can only imagine the exquisite quality of his work in the carpentry shed in Nazareth; everything done in proper measure with perfect timing and balance. Jesus would have spent hours in that shed with Joseph, his foster-father. During the first 30 years of Christ's life, commonly known as the "Hidden Life" in Nazareth, they shared the typical work-a-day experience of most people throughout human history. In so doing, God was blessing ordinary work. The Church, therefore, sees work as an opportunity for us all to receive grace.

From a Catholic perspective, we are called to "offer up" the joys and sufferings of our work lives, wherever we find ourselves: the student in the classroom, the farmer in the paddock, the person working from home. One expert theologian on St Joseph said that most people are not aware of how hard his life would have been. The flight to Egypt to escape King Herod's soldiers who were trying to kill Baby Jesus would have been a very difficult journey. The route the Holy Family took from Bethlehem was very dangerous because it was a favourite road for bandits. However, St Joseph, the guardian of Jesus and Mary was equal to the task. We can easily imagine Joseph, staff in hand, protecting his precious human cargo from all comers. So, let's pray to St Joseph this week to protect our families from spiritual and physical perils.

Do you know what they're vaping?

Immaculate Heart College, like many other schools, has seen a recent increase in young people vaping.

E-cigarettes, or 'vapes', are not safe for young people. They come in many shapes and sizes and can be hard to spot as they can look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

Key vaping facts

- Many vapes contain nicotine. Nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development, including impaired learning ability and altered mood, and can increase the risk of depression and anxiety.
- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray, which can lead to serious lung diseases.
- Young people who vape are 3 times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.

The laws around selling vapes

It is reported that young people often purchase vapes online, from retail stores or from friends and contacts in the community. However, it is illegal in WA to sell e-cigarette devices and nicotine vaping products to anyone regardless of age, unless they are prescribed by a doctor for smoking cessation purposes and obtained with a prescription from a pharmacy. E-cigarette devices and their components, whether they contain nicotine or not, cannot be sold by tobacco or general retailers in WA. You can report suspected illegal sales of vapes to the Department of Health by emailing TobaccoPolicy@health.wa.gov.au.


