From the Heart

Friday of this week features the Feast Day of an amazing young man whose later life was mostly spent in the Hawaiian Island of Molokai. To say this, is to immediately conjure up images of exotic holiday locations, 5-star hotels and beach life. However, at the time in which Fr Damien de Veuster lived, Molokai was a leper colony. He bravely volunteered to go on mission to this "cursed isle". Fr Damien was Belgian and was therefore ill-equipped for life on a tropical island, especially one that was inhabited by people who were suffering from a deadly contagious disease. He spent 16 years serving the leprosy patients, finally dying of the same disease in 1889. He was only 49 years old when he passed away. In his first year on Molokai, Fr Damien had to get used to the smell and he also had to learn to treat the skin complaints that the patients suffered. He built proper dwellings on the island for the patients and, as a result of his care for those with leprosy, he became a much-loved priest. In 1992, Pope Saint John Paul II officially confirmed a miracle that had been the result of a French nun praying a novena to Fr Damien of Molokai. Sister Simplicia Hue had been dying of a stomach disease until her prayers were answered through Fr Damien's intercession.



When we arrive at the end of this week, we will have been celebrating Easter for the same amount of time that we observed Lent: 6 weeks. Such is the balance between fasting and feasting in the Church's Liturgical Year. For the next three Sundays, major solemnities will be celebrated: the Ascension of Our Lord into Heaven; the birthday of the Church aka Pentecost; and the Most Holy Trinity. Each Mass invites us to delve deeply into these great mysteries of our Faith so that one day, by God's grace, we will all meet saints such as Damien of Molokai.

Overall, they all had an amazing day and everyone was so well behaved. Well done to all the Year 1 and 2 students!



Latin Exam


At the end of Term 1, the Year 10 Latin class took the National Latin Exam. The National Latin Exam is in fact an international exam. Hundreds of thousands of students sit this exam, all over the world, at the same time, once a year. Many students even in our own region take the exam, including schools in China, Japan, South Korea, Singapore as well as in Australia and New Zealand.

The International Exam is very challenging and demanding. To achieve a gold medal, a student must attain a score of over 95% or above, and for a silver medal between 85-95%. There are no bronze medals.

Three of our IHC students have achieved cum maxima laude (with the greatest praise) at this year's exam, and therefore have won silver medals. These students are: Cara Dobra, Jordan Vale-Kunz and Dakota Covich. Cara only just missed out on a gold medal, with a score of 92.5%. We are extremely proud of the achievement of these students, who have worked so hard this year, and have represented our school so well internationally.

These results in particular, have put Immaculate Heart College on the map in regard to academic rigour and intellectual discipline. Congratulations to all our Latin students who have done so well at this year's exam!

This firsthand approach ensures a deeper understanding of human biology but also cultivates critical thinking and problem-solving abilities essential for future academic and professional endeavours.




Year 9 Visual Arts
